For many years Penny was the CEO of YellowBridge QLD, a not for profit organisation whose core work is in community housing, disability support, home services for seniors and youth support. Prior to joining YellowBridge QLD Penny's professional life was based within the rural community and included the social sciences of agriculture, rural education and environment.

Returning to the Gold Coast, I joined Southport Forum, and in 1995, when the position of State President was on my horizon, I formed Palm Beach Currumbin Forum.

I realised I loved helping people reach their potential (as Forum did for me) and I have never stopped touting Forum - even to strangers on the train, or more recently at a Big Morning Tea where I was guest speaker. Two women who didn't know me had introduced me to this wonderful Forum Association, so I consider it my duty to do the same.

VALE Cath Wood

Cath Wood was a pint sized, much loved Ipswich Forum member who was an active leader for much of the 41 years of her membership in Forum. Sadly, Cath passed away on the evening of 11 April 2023 at the incredible age of 98 years.

Cath was born in Tralee, in 1924 at a difficult time in Ireland. Her father's family was involved in the Irish fight for independence and the tragic Civil War that followed. His brother, Paddy Buckley, was murdered in an infamous incident at Ballyseedy, just 100 years ago. Cath's father escaped at the time and came to Australia. Two years later he brought his wife and two young children to Brisbane.

Cath's FUNERAL service was held at St Mary's Catholic Church, in Ipswich, where Cath had given much service to the Catholic community during her life in Ipswich. The funeral service was conducted by Cath's cousin, Father Brian Buckley, an Augustinian Priest. Members of Ipswich Forum and the State

Committee were in attendance to acknowledge Cath's dedication to Forum. Also in attendance were her large family of six children and her extended family, friends, neighbours, and the many others who recognised the special way Cath had touched their lives, as she spent so much of her own life serving her community. Cath served as a catechist for at least 30 years, helped with school tuckshop, ran the bingo, did lamington drives, baked for fetes, supervised high school exams and helped out in so many other ways.

Forum was one of Cath's real passions. She was encouraged to join Forum at the ripe old age of 58 by a friend and Ipswich member, Margaret Gilmore. Initially, Cath fought against this, but finally she decided that she needed to join Forum to gain self-confidence, after she had struggled to introduce herself at a special gathering following the first Mass conducted by her cousin.



This special dynamo soon became Ipswich Forum's Treasurer, and held one role or another from that moment on - either Secretary, Treasurer, Vice President, President, Chief Assessor, or Delegate.

Cath extended her Forum involvement to the South-East Regional Council in 1992 holding roles such as Treasurer, Secretary, and SERC Delegate and became Chair of the Assessors' Panel in 2000 to 2005 and then joined the Finance Standing Committee in 2005-2007.

It was in 2019 that failing health & age saw Cath forced to leave her home in Basin Pocket and move into Riverview Gardens Aged Care Facility, where she continued to have an unforgettable effect on those around her, as witnessed by the tears of other residents at her funeral.

Those that remember Cath's Forum journey, will treasure her dedication to Forum, the bundle of energy she brought to the group, and her total commitment at all times.

They will know her artistic talents were often used generously to create invitations or programmes for special occasions that Ipswich Forum hosted. Her unforgettable speech about the love-making antics of the most colourful of BLUE-BIRDS – all hidden by the darkness of night – will not be forgotten.



There have been many members who joined Ipswich Forum after Cath, and many would be aware of the strong role that she played in their Forum Life. I am just one of them.

REST IN PEACE, Dear Cath, your prayers have been answered and you are now with your beloved FATHER IN HEAVEN.

Since then, I've met so many people who've helped me to bring my ideas to life. Some of those people have had to be quite patient with me on occasion. My ideas are very specific; I chose to self-publish for this very reason. That, and the fact that third-party publishers would struggle to find a proper category for my books. I've pretty

much created a category for where I saw bookstores and libraries were lacking: Superhero books for ages 11 and up, for those who would like to read something more mature than kids' superhero stories but without swear words, dark magic, occult, inappropriate sexual content and excessive gore that generally comes with adults' stories.

Now, things have started to really get moving. Just recently, my ecommerce website was launched and is up and running. I've printed a couple of copies of my book. I'm learning a lot about marketing and set up Facebook and Instagram accounts for that purpose. I learnt how to write a pitch for my product thanks to Forum. Forum gave some handy hints and awesome advice about writing a pitch, and I gained a couple of new customers!

The Origin of Sword Master: Second Chances is the first book I have published. It tells the story of a young boy, named Rifle, whose life is turned upside down after a fire destroys his home and separates him from his family, leaving him only with his twin brother, Tyler.

The twins are adopted by a vigilante crime-fighter. One twin trains to become a superhero while the other chooses a path of crime.

Bremer Forum – Leanne Walker

Bremer member Leanne Walker is involved in a program called Story Dogs. This is a volunteer organization whereby the owner of an approved 'Story Dog' goes into a school, and students selected by teachers read to the dog and its owner. Leanne spends time every second week down in South Golden Beach with her daughter, her grandson and their dog, Doogie, and takes him to school for this purpose. In a non-judgemental setting, the children's focus improves, their literacy skills increase and their confidence soars. The accepting, loving nature of dogs gives this program its magic and helps children relax, open up, try harder and have fun while reading to a friendly, calm dog. Leanne also loves to put her teaching skills and expertise in literacy to good use in this role. Currently 612 volunteer Dog Teams support 3090 students around Australia in 365 schools.

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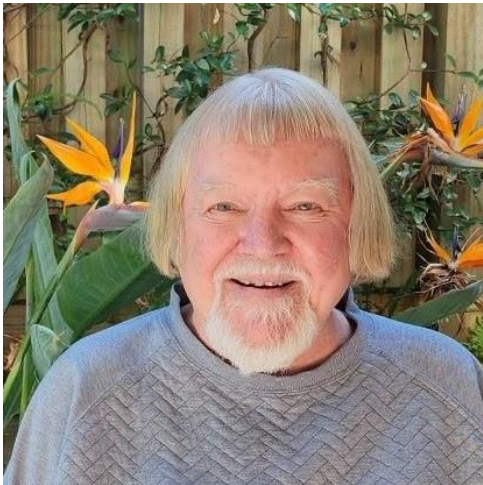

Chermside Forum – Bruce Kent

Chermside Forum member Bruce Kent is currently Chermside's quiz master who vehemently carries a Plantagenet haircut. Bruce however has a very interesting background which is worth a mention. Bruce attended St Columban's Catholic College at Albion in the late 1960s before moving into his first job with the Commonwealth Bank. After three short months in that role Bruce moved to the Gold Coast and, looking for something a bit more exciting, he joined a local surf club and became a professional surfer. When the time came to move on Bruce relocated to Sydney where he qualified as a male nurse, after which he had a complete career change and joined the Army as an electrical technician with the signal corps. Barrack's life didn't appeal to Bruce at the time, so he contacted a local real estate agent who found him a five acre farm to rent, not far from the Army base. This farm included a broken down house and barn, which Bruce and his friends named 'The House of the Screaming Radish', and eventually housed Bruce plus 19 of his friends - all living the hippy lifestyle of that era. It was a life of bliss,

but like all good things, that time came to an end. Using the skills learnt in the army, Bruce went on to join Rank Xerox. This role eventually saw Bruce relocate to Tasmania, and it was here that he became interested in politics, joining the Australian Democrats and standing for election to parliament. Being passionate about democracy and environmental conservation, Bruce joined in the Franklin dam protests, camping out, parading with the floats and eventually getting himself arrested. After spending a



week in Risdon prison he negotiated with authorities and agreed to leave Tasmania to avoid further prosecution. From there Bruce moved to Melbourne where he became a swim instructor for a few months, until another opportunity came knocking and which saw him transfer to Adelaide for two years to help manage a friend's business. When that secondment came to an end Bruce ventured to Roxby Downs for a short time to protest against Uranium Mining, before returning to life in the familiar surrounds of Brisbane. This led to Bruce driving taxis to support himself whilst furthering his studies at the University of New England, having previously obtained an Arts degree and Bachelor of Education at the University of Tasmania. Bruce is a registered teacher and has taught in many schools, but his greatest love was tutoring English to Asian students at the Kangaroo Point campus of Shaftston International College. Since being back in Brisbane Bruce has stood as an independent candidate for the electorate of Aspley, is a long time member of the QLD Herb Society at Albion – which involves selling home grown herbs, and attends the Zillmere Library reading group. As you can see - there's never a dull moment in Bruce's life!

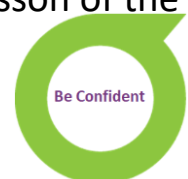
